

Will Select 1,000 DP Girls As Domestic for Canada

Herford, Aug. 26 (Reuters).—A party of Canadian officials will arrive in Hanover tomorrow to begin selection of 1,000 women from among displaced persons for domestic work in Canada, the International Refugee Organization announced today. The first party of immigrants leave in October.

Several similar selection teams of Canadian experts are travelling through Europe to select immigrants, which Reconstruction Minister Howe last week said would eventually reach an influx of 2,500 to 3,000 a month by combined ship and plane transit.

The scheme is part of a four-pronged Canadian policy. Already some 10,000 persons have arrived

in Canada under the scheme to bring over European relatives of Canadians. Immigrants from the United Kingdom, including 7,000 to be brought to Ontario, are reported to be coming over as fast as passage can be obtained.

Group movements so far have included 3,000 Dutch farmers and 5,000 former Polish soldiers as farm laborers.

The 1,000 domestics will be part of an initial movement of 10,000 displaced persons from camps in Germany. These will also include needle-workers and loggers.

On his return from Europe last week, however, Mr. Howe said the government had given no consideration to bringing in former enemy nationals.
